We're coming to a close on another successful semester for WRUR! We would like to thank everyone who has kept up with us since the beginning of the semester, and we are excited to see what the upcoming spring semester has in store for us.

Since the start of the academic year, we have welcomed many new faces to our station as well as welcomed back our current members. There are currently over 100 affiliate members, with around 60 members actively participating in our weekly meetings and club events. The sense of community that we have built throughout the past few years during the pandemic has only gotten stronger as we begin to shift into a post-pandemic collegiate environment. Greetings from the WRUR Engineering Department!

For the fall 2022 semester we have been working on a couple of projects to build out the department a bit more. One of the projects is clearing out the old station recording studio and doing an audit of the old equipment determining what is needed and if the equipment is usable. If the equipment is useful, the department is trying to manage any repairs or cleaning in house. In addition to this project, we are also working on a number of smaller repairs around the station (i.e. solving issues with phones, printers, CD players, and other outboard equipment). As training for newer members in the Engineering Department I have put together a speakers and amplifier kit to help get a better understanding of how to use the department's tools as well as gain a better understanding of electronics in context.



Memory Lane Interview with WRUR Alumnus Steve Katz '97



How did you first become involved in WRUR?

I first joined WRUR as part of the news department, which was really active at the time. Freshman year, I had a vague idea that I might want to be a journalist, and I remember walking to campus one Monday before joining and seeing a newspaper which said that Patti Hearst was arrested. I rushed to the department to see if they had an Associated Press machine, which they did. After this, I got more involved in the station by hosting news segments on air and becoming a DJ.

What were some of your favorite experiences from WRUR?

While I was there, probably as a junior or sophomore, the station had shows take place at 6am where they would play strictly jazz and deliver the news. I got to do the first show as the news guy broadcasting with a DJ.

In those days the news department would do a special '24/7 coverage' during election night. We would have remote reporters at the different political party headquarters, who called in and brought us news that we would use to quickly make and deliver stories on the air. WRUR was also involved in this dance marathon, to raise money for charity. Couples would sign up and compete to see who could dance the longest, and the event would go on over the weekend. I got to be a DJ for the dance marathon one year, which was a lot of fun.

How did being a part of WRUR affect how you listen to/engage with music?

My musical knowledge in high school was pretty limited to the top 40. When I started hanging out around WRUR, all the DJ's were playing progressive rock, and it opened my ears to things that I had never heard before. My whole knowledge of bands like Pink Floyd and David Bowie came from radio. The people who liked jazz at the station would take me to jazz shows too. I went to see a band called the Renaissance who were performing for the Rochester Philharmonic one time. It was terrific.

Are there any parallels you could draw between things you were doing in WRUR and what you do now as a career?

I came to college with a vague idea of what I wanted to do, because I was the editor of the high school paper. Then you come to college and realize that everyone was the editor of the high school paper because it was the University of Rochester. So then I came to Rochester and wrote for a bit. I majored in Political Science and International Relations because I wanted to major in something that would be useful to know about if I were to go into journalism. I came out of Rochester already working at a local TV station, worked my way up from a technical assistant, and then in a few years over time my journalism career took off. I became an overseas correspondent. I covered all of those themes that seemed academic and interesting in college. What I learned in WRUR helped me learn how to do news broadcasting, and my classes helped me learn how to do journalism on those topics.

What was the most valuable lesson you learned during your time at WRUR?

When you do radio, it seems that it's just you with a mic, and your creativity. Working as part of the station played a role in my understanding of media being a collaborative industry. It may be one person's voice that you hear, but there's people working the microphones and the cameras, collaborating on the production.

This year, The Sting started off with change: we got a new board! Thanks to the donations and patrons of WRUR, The Sting had enough funds to purchase a brand new, smaller board for The Sting — one that is a replica of the new board in FM. Because of this (as well as an upgrade to ENCO, our broadcasting software), shows and demos started later than usual, but worry not! As soon as we could, there was a line out the door of old and new DJs who were more than ready to get back on air. The Sting has 32 active shows on air right now with seven of them being brand new!

With the new year, more DJs are utilizing both our physical and digital library with an increase of students using CDs from our collection and tracks off of ENCO. We're also expanding into talk shows and podcasting very soon! In the works are a couple interview-based shows, an advice corner, and building out the demo studio to be a functional recording space. My main goal for the rest of the year is to continue increasing our shows and fill up all those empty slots, as well as really making The Sting reach its full potential. As an internet radio station, there is truly so much space for creative freedom, and I want to make sure that is being utilized. I hope you're just as excited as I am about this, so be sure to stick around and tune in!
